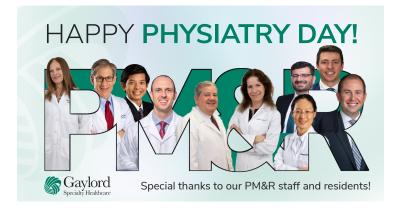


Gaylord SLP Presents at UConn Health Symposium

INTERNATIONAL AAC AWARENESS MONTH

is celebrated globally each October. The goal is to raise **awareness** of and **celebrate** Augmentative and Alternative Communication (AAC) and to **educate** people about the many different ways in which people communicate using communication devices. This includes any form of communication such as gestures, picture cards, or speech generating devices.



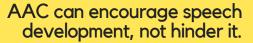
People who use AAC to communicate love to chat just as much as you do!

There are many ways of communicating. AAC users may use multiple means, with different people, in different contexts, and at different times.





People who use AAC need access to many different types of AAC -- from sign language and pen and paper all the way up to speech generating devices.







Talk directly to the person who is using AAC, not to an accompanying family member or assistant.

Most people who use AAC have typical hearing. Speak in a normal tone of voice, without exaggerating.





A patient attitude is an effective tool in communicating with people who use AAC.

Ask individuals about their preferences. For example, some people who use AAC don't like it when people read over their shoulders or finish their sentences before they completely type them out.





People who use AAC need access to an appropriate AAC system that is not restricted to selection based on their assumed abilities.

It may look as if people who use AAC are not communicating, but people can control whole AAC systems with any body part, including their eyes!





AAC competence can take a long time to build.

People who use AAC have various levels of independence. Don't assume they need an assistant.

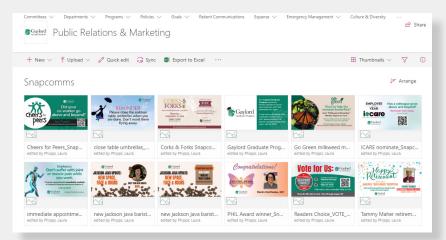

Employee Flu Vaccine Program

We have seen a great start to our annual employee flu vaccine program this year. Just a friendly reminder that the annual influenza vaccine is mandatory for all employees including volunteers, students, and contract staff per hospital policy and as a condition of employment.

This year's Employee Influenza (Flu) Vaccine Clinics are still being held **through Friday**, **November 14th** in Brooker Lecture Hall, facilitated by Griffin Hospital.

Griffin Hospital will also be offering high-dose for those staff that are 65 and over and will accept all health insurances.



Important Reminder:

Griffin Hospital still requires all employees to bring a PHYSICAL PHOTOCOPY of their insurance card-front and back to any of the flu clinics.

Staff at the clinics will not have the ability to make photo copies for employees arriving to get their flu vaccine and may be turned away.
